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"Whether in chains or in laurels, liberty knows nothing but victories."—Wendell Phillips.

The above quotation appears on the statue of Wendell Phillips in the Public Garden, Boston. Its indomitable spirit impels our admiration.

Wendell Phillips was born in Boston in 1811, graduated at the Boston Latin School and Harvard College. He died at his home, Common street, Boston, in 1884. His father, John M. Phillips, was the first mayor of Boston.

Phillips is best known as a humanitarian and as an orator. He was a handsome man with noble features and a commanding presence. While still young he became interested in the anti-slavery cause. His marvelous gift of oratory, his great courage in facing the antagonistic mob, made him one of the most thrilling and successful speakers for his cause. He never spared himself and never refused the incessant calls on his time and ability. Nor, though he earned his living as a lecturer, did he ever accept pay for his services to the anti-slavery party.

As early as 1831, The Liberator was first published in the interest of slave freedom. From then until the Emancipation a crescenting group of fine men and women worked with a selfless regard, in a true service to humanity. We have but to throw ourselves mentally into the slaves' place to quiver with horror as we sense their misery. No help could come to them from within. It was only from others with sympathy, vision and the will to persist that the stigma of slavery could be wiped out. How their great names leap to the mind! Lloyd Garrison, John Brown, Lovejoy, Julia Ward Howe and Wendell Phillips.

At this Memorial day season we should give thought to those who also helped save the Union some by yielding their lives, some by holding aloft the banner of the Erotherhood of Man and the pricelessness of Liberty.

A. G. GUYER

Arthur G. Guyer was born in Wolcott, Vt., Sept. 30, 1860. Attended the public schools of the town and later the P. A. & M. G. S. Morrisville, Vt. His early days were spent in the lumber business. About 1880 began the drug business as clerk for A. O. Gates, Morrisville, Vt. Came to Hyannis in 1883, formed a partnership with Dr. Geo. W. Doane and opened the First drug store in Hyannis. In 1893 bought out Dr. Doane and has been in the drug business up to the present time. He brought the first bicycle to Hyannis and in 1894 opened a bicycle store under the name of Guyer Cycle Co. About this time in company with his sister opened the first jewelry store in Hyannis.

In 1901 organized and incorporated the Cape Cod Telephone Co. and was treasurer and manager for ten years at which time they sold to the N. E. Tel. & Tel. Co. He was elected the first president of the Cape Cod Hospital which office he still holds. He has been Prudential committee and treasurer of the Universalist Church; Prudential Committee treasurer and Engineer Hyannis Fire District; President Hyannis Board of Trade; Master and treasurer of Fraternal Lodge; High Priest and treasurer of Orient R. A. Chapter; president Hyannis Rifle Club; president Hyannis Bicycle Club; Consul for the League of American Wheelman.

He is a member of the Hyannis Board of Trade, Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce, Hyannis Library Association, Hyannis Rotary Club, Ancient & Honorable Artillery Co. of Boston, Mass. State Pharmaceutical Association, Wequaquet Lodge Knights of Pythias, Cape Cod Farm Bureau, A. L. A. Grange, Hyannis, Pomona, State and National, Matakese Chapter Eastern Star, Bethel, Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, Aleppo Temple, Boston, A. A. O. N. Mystic Shrine, Massachusetts Consistory, Lodge of Perfection, Council and Chapter, Order of High Priesthood, Past Masters Association, Sutton Comandery Knights Templars, New Bedford, New Bedford Council R. & S.
